Davids Diary

Both our A7s have been out and about again this month. We drove Mabel, our 1934 AH Tourer, up to Throwleigh on the 19th August for their annual Village Fair. It is a very small traditional Dartmoor event and as Pete Gilbert is involved with the organisation, we always try to attend. The setting is just superb and it is a good excuse to have a run out across Dartmoor with the hood down.

A week later and the plan was to take Ernie, the Milk Delivery Car, to the Seaton Show. However, he clearly did not fancy the drive, as when I opened the garage, the first thing I saw was a flat tyre. Being a little short on time, I took Mabel instead. At this show, all the cars are parked up along the seafront and Michael Tabeart had managed to get all of the A7s which attended, parked up together which attracted much attention. With the cars parked up on a public road, many of the people looking around had just come out for a walk on the seafront rather than with the intention of looking at cars. An ideal opportunity to 'spread the A7 word' especially amongst the young. Another very enjoyable day with no mechanical issues.

Back home and I found that the flat tyre had been caused by a faulty valve. Not being able to find a replacement one, I cleaned it up with some brake cleaner fluid and screwed it back into place and all was well.







We did take Ernie out on the 12th September to the Widecombe Fair. This is just such a unique annual event and the A7 owners are made really welcome. This year we were given two parades in the show ring with yours truly being roped in to do the commentary. The organisers even give a special 'Best A7 in Show' award which this year was won by Mark Nutbeen with his very smart Ruby. Another great day out and for once it remained dry for most of the day. On the 14th Sept, we set out in Mabel to start a trip that I have been thinking about for a couple of years. Over a 6 month period in 2021 I walked the S.W. During the walk, I found myself on many picturesque coastal lanes, and it occurred to me that linked together, they would make for an interesting drive in an A7. After spending quite a few evenings with my O.S. maps, I sketched out a route in the reverse direction to my walk and we set aside 5 or 6 days to complete it.

I will do a more detailed write up in future newsletters but suffice it to say that I totally underestimated the time it would take to navigate the very challenging lanes along the coast, and in particular in the S. Hams area. We only managed 3 days driving and reached Modbury before being beaten by weather and time but have plans to set off again (weather permitting) in October to complete the trip.



The sale of parts will be a FREE service to members, BUT

We can only accept parts for sale on the following basis:-

- Every part or collection of parts must have a tie on luggage label attached with your membership number (NO NAME PLEASE), price required, and if it is not obvious, a description of what the part is.
- When the item is sold the label will be cut off and kept with the money to be returned to the member.
- Members can, if they wish, indicate on the label how much reduction they are willing to give to 'hagglers'. This will be indicated by adding a letter, (A, B, or C) after the price, 'A' will entitle the stallholder to give a maximum of 10% reduction, 'B' 20% and 'C' 50%.

e.g. a label could read Mem No 5. - £100 B.

(Selling for member No.5, price £100 possible 20% reduction)

We are aware that there is always a certain amount of pilfering goes on at these events and whilst the people on the stall will be as vigilant as possible, neither the individual nor the club can accept responsibility for any losses.



Why I own and Austin 7 - Adam Mason

Walter Carr was an 'Austin Man', and he was my Grandpa. He worked at the Austin Plant in Longbridge most of his life. He was the son of John Carr, a somewhat entrepreneurial general store owner in the tiny village of Kingsley in Staffordshire. John was the illegitimate son of a seamstress who worked at the manor, 'Alton Towers'. His Fatherhood was questionable, but judging by his attitude to life, his father was not the gardener!!

Walter shadowed his Father John in his early life, doing delivery work in the first steam lorry in Staffordshire, serving ice creams on Johns stall at the stepping stones over the river Dove in Dovedale, and working the Cinematograph machine in the village hall showing early movies.





As a young man, as many did, he moved down to Birmingham for work. He found an engineering job in Handsworth in the north of the city. Here he met the beautiful Ethel Bird, later to be my Nanna. Walter was way out of his depth pursuing her, but continued tirelessly, until she finally gave in and agreed to become Ethel Carr. Ethel must have had one moment of weakness in her married life, because in flaming June 1930 my Mother was born. Walter was despatched in to town to register the birth, and was told by Ethel that the baby was to be called Ruth Jane. Much out of character, whilst on the bus to the register office, Walter decided that she was going to be named Cynthia. So that's what she became. I wish I had been around to witness his return home.

Ethel had aspirations, so at some point in the 1920's Walter had a go at bettering himself and at this point I think, started work at Austin. He travelled from Handsworth each day in the back of an open truck with a bunch of mates. I assume it would have been a very uncomfortable ride, probably on solid tyres. On these travels he saw being built some new houses, high on a hill overlooking the Longbridge plant, on the outskirts of Northfield village. He bought one off plan, and this is where my Mother grew up. She recalls summer evenings trying to sleep, listening and feeling the thumping of the stamp shop, probably stamping out the crankshafts of the Austins we still drive today.




26 Park View road was a sanctuary for me as a boy and young man. I spent a lot of my holidays there whilst my parents were working. On these days Walter taught me a whole host of useful skills, spending many hours in his garage. During my time at Austin, on the days I was working at the factory and not MIRA (Motor Industry Research Association) in Nuneaton, or at college, there was always a hot dinner waiting at Nanna's, always with pudding and custard. Nanna considered that my Mother didn't feed me properly, and I was happy to go along with this! To be fair, she was probably right.

We are not sure exactly what Walter got up to at Longbridge, but he did consider himself in the acquaintance of Herbert Austin, who I believe did spend time on the shop floor getting to know his workforce. Walter was born prematurely, and was very lucky to survive being born in the late 1800's, but it did leave him with some health issues, and he was also quite

short. Consequently, during World War 2, as he was also in a reserved occupation, he worked supervising ladies operating capstan lathes. Before he died, he gave me an interesting micrometer which has a tumbler readout much like the milometer in pre digital cars. It was commissioned by the Austin for the ladies on the lathes as it was considered that they would not be able to read the vernier scale on a standard micrometer. How times have changed!!

Austin pioneered the machining transfer line to produce the many repetitive mechanical parts they needed. The raw component, casting, forging or metal billet was loaded on to a platon, which then moved left and right along the production line conveyor having all its drilling, tapping, milling operations carried out along the way, popping out the end complete. I am fairly sure Walter was involved in the development of this which helped to speed up the production process enormously. I remember when I was a boy, when he was in later life he worked in the demonstration department, teaching the new operatives how to run the component production lines.



Now here is where I come in! Much to my parent's disappointment, I managed to leave King Edwards Grammar school with one GCE O-Level in Metalwork, and one in English Language. My mother wanted me to join JCB or Rolls Royce as a consultant engineer but this ambition was cruelly dashed!! Walter came to the rescue, grabbed me by the proverbial ear and dragged me off to the North Works Training Centre at Longbridge to be assessed for an apprenticeship. "I know people there" he said. I was given tasks involving gears, cogs and levers and they must have seen something in this long haired 15-year-old oik, as they offered me a technical apprenticeship at the factory. I started in September 1976 and served 5 years including studying at North Worcestershire College. Here my tutors and mentors succeeded where my school teachers had failed. I flew through academically, and gained distinctions in every subject! In 1981 I received my indenture certificate qualifying as a full-blown Vehicle Research and Development Engineer.

Sadly, I didn't get to keep my green apprentice overalls, but still use many of the tools I made during my time at Longbridge, including my small travelling toolbox.

It was an unfortunate time to be released in to the workforce, the company was suffering terribly with union damage, and some not very well selling cars. Margaret Thatcher was on the rampage, and instructed Sir Michael Edwards to quash the unions and rationalise the business. Basically, no jobs. I decided to leave and spend a year at Lanchester Poly enhancing my engineering knowledge. During the summer following, I was working as a sailing instructor in Salcombe, and a certain Sarah Pollard was working there too, in the office. I think you know where this is leading!

In 1983 I responded to an advert in the Helston job centre requiring a draughtsman for a local marine engineering company. I was lucky enough to be offered the job, and Sarah P and I eventually moved to Falmouth in the September of that year. We got married the following year, and went on to have our family, and live a happy life in Cornwall.

In the late 1990's I had moved company, and worked with an old guy called Eddie Angel (sorry Ed), some of you may know him!! He came in to work one day with his newly acquired Austin Seven RP saloon. He took me for a ride around the block and told me about all the adventures he was planning with the Cornwall Austin Seven Club. I was quite taken with this as an idea, something Sarah and I could enjoy together. I parked this idea away in my brain for a few years, until one evening I put in an eBay bid for a very scruffy, very cheap Ruby Mk1. I won the bid, and arranged for the car to be delivered to Cornwall. It was rough, but mechanically not too bad. There were some initial engine and half shaft issues, but having rectified these it became a very useable car, and confirmed that we wanted to continue being Austin Seven owners. A couple of years later we were told about a really nice RP saloon for sale in Bideford. We went to see it, and couldn't resist. This is the car we have now, usually known as BEV. She has taken us everywhere in the last 11 years, and covered at least 30,000 miles, probably more as the speedo was broken for a year or two. This meant selling the Ruby. It went to a second-hand car salesman in Bude. When he handed over the cash, he gave me a sad look, and explained to me that it was the only car he had ever paid full price for!!

Here I am now in my first year of retirement, 46 years of constant work after walking in to the training centre at Longbridge. I often wonder where I might have ended up without my Grandpa's influence growing up, and his intervention when I was 15. I don't think I would have lived my life in Cornwall, and probably wouldn't be driving an Austin Seven.

Incidentally, you now know why my newly restored RK saloon is called 'Wal'.

Which is what this little tale has really been about, why I have an Austin Seven. I hope you enjoyed reading it, it was also fun for me to recall my memories and get them written down in words.



A7 Memories

One of the many people to visit the A7 stand at Widecombe Fair for a chat and to reminisce, was Jim Portus MBE. Jim has since sent us this photo, and says:

"Here is a photo of my father at right and my grandfather at left. My father, William Hodder Oliver Portus, went to Hele School, Exeter. He served an engineering apprenticeship locally before the war. The photo is likely pre-war, but I'm unsure. The location is 54, Okehampton Street, Exeter. Grandfather also had a garage in Victoria Street, Exmouth at some time before his death in 1953. My grandmother lived in Clyst Road, Topsham. Grandfather served as



Captain in REME through the war. My father served in the RAF on barrage balloons in Falmouth. I'd be fascinated if any of these 3 Austin vehicles has survived."

David's research indicates that all 3 cars were registered in the 1930s, but there is no evidence to show that any of them are still on the road. If you know anything about any of these cars please get in touch with David Aylmore, contact details on the back page.




