This year I had some proper straps to hold it on the roof, so no hand through the window to steady it.





I realised that on my Xmas tree trip I had had the lights on and although those were switched off on my return I had left on the bulbs which 'illuminate' the dials. They're so dim that they're easily forgotten. The expression 'Dim as a Toc H lamp came to mind.' My spare battery was also flat but a burst of 12volts from my caravan leisure battery via some jump leads soon turned the engine over - at great speed! and once started all was well. I must change the bulbs for LEDs which give some brightness.

My Ruby has a Klaxon type horn. It mostly works except when its cold or the points need adjusting. If you live in a house where you have neighbours close by then adjusting the points on a Klaxon horn is not that welcome! Which is how after a long warm up run I came to find myself in a deserted lay by on the A39 with the bonnet up and me trying to adjust the horn. With only sheep to annoy I got the job done, though it was very cold on the fingers.





I rarely, if ever see an Austin Seven on the road apart from the North Devon group's monthly run. As regular readers will know it is one of my aims during my chairmanship of the club to get our cars out and about. Dashboard Bulbs

After my flat battery experience (see above) I managed to source some LED bulbs to replace the standard 6v 4w ones.




The photographs rather distort the actual bulbs but they do fit the holders. They have a 15mm base diameter.




A selection of 1930's Motoring books need a new home.




If these titles would be of interest to any Club member, I have his agreement to pass the books on for a suitable donation:



ALL THAT GLITTERS IS NOT GOLD - 1954

There was a loud bang followed by lots of smoke pouring from the bonnet of Dad's lovely 1938 Mecedes Benz Cabriolet, which brought our mission to the Chemist in Wadebridge to an abrupt halt. We pushed the car back up the long drive and had a cuppa, whilst Dad poked around under the bonnet. Our home was halfway between Wadebridge and Bodmin, Wadebridge was lovely but Bodmin appeared to be shrouded in a mantle of gloom, having once had a Gaol and a Mental Hospital; there was an old Cornish saying that 'yer was either sent to Bodmin or took to Bodmin'.

Dad declared that the Merc needed intensive care and therefore we would take Mum's Austin 7 Convertible instead. At that moment there was the sound of a throaty exhaust, followed by a shiny, gold coloured Aston Martin, which slid to a halt beside us. It was Dad's old RAF mate, 'Step-on-It' (the sobriquet was based on his driving style), who was a very Gung-Ho, ex Fighter Pilot, from 'The Quick and The Dead' school of driving. It was agreed that I would go on the mission to Wadebridge with Step-On-It and so Dad gave him directions and said that I knew where the Chemist was. Step-on-It donned his Checked Cap, pulled on his String-backed gloves and, with a quick twirl of his moustache and a nasty glint in his eye, we were off, and when I say off, I mean OFF! We covered the long drive in the blink of an eye and by the time we got to the main road, I was a terrified ten-year-old, and where Dad would pause to look left, right and then left again before turning LEFT to Wadebridge, 'Step-on-It's' approach was entirely different.

We arrived at the Lodge Gates in a 'four-wheel drift' and then he executed a handbrake turn to the RIGHT, in the direction of Bodmin. Well, if the old Cornish saying was correct, 'Step-on-It' was a prime candidate for both the Gaol and Mental Hospital. I was recovering from the immense 'G forces' when I realised that we were heading towards the wrong town. We were back up to about 80mph and reached Bodmin in the blink of another eye, at which point I prayed that either 'Men in White Coats' or a Gaoler with Handcuffs would come to my rescue. No such luck, we slid to a halt and 'Step-on-It' said 'right, where's the Chemist'. I falteringly advised him that we were in the wrong town, at which point he transmogrified from friendly, feisty 'Uncle' into a fearsome monster and berated me for letting him turn right instead of left at the Lodge. I suppose I could have tapped him politely on the shoulder, during his 'lock to lock' maneuvers, to suggest 'left hand down a bit' but that would have been suicidal rather than helpful.

I felt hurt at his criticism, however, I just sat there and 'took it' until he had calmed down and asked a passing Policeman if there was a Chemist close by, which there was but it was closed. Step-on-It went into a 'huff', and we cruised back at a mere 60 mph and managed to turn into the drive without demolishing the Lodge. Soon after we arrived home, he declared a pressing engagement and shot off in a spray of gravel, never to be seen again. After lunch we pottered off to Wadebridge in Mum's A7 at a relaxing 30mph. The two drives that day were as 'Chalk and Cheese' and although I still loved exciting cars, I lowered my aspirations to something modest and therefore, when I turned 17, I bought my first car, a lovely Austin 7 Opal Tourer in pillar box red; I wish I had it now!

Those of you who have read my ramblings over the past few years will know that we have spent a huge amount of time trying to trace the history of our Milk Delivery Car. It being such an unusual model and having been first registered in the relatively small county of Herefordshire, we were optimistic about the success of our mission. However, some 9 years later and we are no further forward.

Bizarrely, we have made no such effort to look into the early years of our 1934 AH Tourer which we have owned for a considerably longer time than the MDC. However, a chance remark from an interested member of the public whilst we were on our tour around the S.W. Coast has set the ball in motion.

We were parked up for some lunch on the seafront in Sennen Cove when I was asked how old Mabel was. "Built in 1934" I replied, prompting a comment "It will be her 90th birthday next year then".


That got me thinking about what we might do to celebrate and so on returning home, I started to do a bit of digging. I do have an early buff logbook which shows the first registration date of 29th March 1934. A check on the website - www.oldclassiccar.co.uk/registrations/reg-letters.htm confirmed that the location was

Buckinghamshire.

I then e-mailed the
Buckinghamshire Archive
Records Office to ask if they
still had the Vehicle
Registration information from
1934 for Mabel's reg.
number, APP108. I must
admit that having done a
similar exercise with the
Herefordshire Archive with
no success, I was not
optimistic.

However, within a few days I had a very helpful reply saying that they did hold some records and for a small fee would be happy to supply a PDF. This is what arrived

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After a quick Google of 'Rosmer' & 'Hawridge' it transpires that a Mr Milton Rosmer who lived in the Village of Hawridge was a famous film actor of the day. His wife was also an actress under the name of Irene Rooke, and as there is no trace of any children, it would appear that the entry in the Register of 'Miss' I Rosmer is probably an error and should have been 'Mrs'.

From a bit more research with the help of the local Historical Society, I found that the Rosmer's home was Box Tree Cottage and it has survived to this day.



Our plan now is to drive up to Buckinghamshire in March and visit the building where Vehicle Registrations were recorded in 1934 and take Mabel back to her first home – Box Tree Cottage. It Should be an interesting trip.

Can you help?



A RECOMMENDED READ FOR VINTAGE CAR DRIVERS

This book might not appeal to the average A7 enthusiast, but bear with me. As with all of Yann Martel's books, it is somewhat strange, but the first third of the book will surely appeal to all of us.

It is set in Lisbon in 1904 and tells the story of Tomas, a young man, who is lent an automobile by his uncle in order to travel on a mission to the high mountains of Portugal. Tomas has never seen an automobile before and has no idea how the "steerage wheel" works, let alone the confusion of pedals and levers. He is terrified of the idea that the 4 cylinder beast contains fire beneath its metal casing, although the horn makes him laugh and he is impressed by the custom-made elephant hide outer covering! His first ride as a passenger gives him motion sickness and he spends the first three days driving in first gear, before finally braving the use of the "change speed lever". He is much more



diligent with his lubricating regime than I am, spending four hours attending to this on his second morning before setting out.

His encounters with country folk, who have never seen a mechanised beast before, are as entertaining as his ongoing battle with the "steerage wheel" and starting handle. The endless search for "moto-naphtha" in chemists and hardware stores reminds me of searching for methylated spirits for my Trangia camping stove in Muslim countries many years ago. As a relatively new vintage car owner, with about as much technical knowledge as Tomas, I could identify with his fears and technical issues, but even I know how to turn a "steerage wheel"! The rest of the book becomes increasingly bizarre, but I firmly believe it is worth a read for the first section alone. I have a copy, if anyone would like to borrow it. Happy reading!


